## 1. INTRODUCTION

The annual Foreign Trade Statistics Report is produced by the External Sector Statistics (ESS) Unit, formerly Balance of Payments Unit of the Economics and Statistics Office (ESO). The statistics on imports are primarily obtained from the computerized records of the Customs Department as maintained by the Computer Services Department as well as from data generated from the Total Revenue Integrated Processing System (TRIPS). These records are based on documents of imports and exports of goods as completed by importers, exporters or their agents who are required to record the appropriate statistical tariff code using the Cayman Islands Customs Tariff Law (CICTL). The CICTL is based on the Harmonised System (Harmonised Commodity Description and Coding System) of the Customs Cooperation Council (CCC).

The task of the ESO is mainly to classify the Customs data using the Standard International Trade Classification (SITC) Revision 3, incorporate data from other relevant sources such as the Port Authority and the Petroleum Inspectorate, and present the data in aggregate format. The process of classification by SITC is a time-intensive, laborious task as there have been a significant number of goods that are not classified or misclassified. The objective of the classification process at ESO has been to minimize the number of such cases; over the years, the value of commodities that are not classified by SITC codes has diminished.

In addition to the classification by SITC codes, ESO also classifies all imported commodities by Broad Economic Category (BEC) based on international guidelines issued by the United Nations Statistical Division (UNSD).

ESO compiles exports data mainly from external sources namely, the US Census Bureau, the Statistical Institute of Jamaica and the UK Trade Data Online website.

## 2. EXPLANATORY NOTES AND DEFINITIONS

### 2.1 Trade Classification Systems

The Cayman Islands' version of the Harmonized System of Classification is the primary classification standard used for the Cayman Islands' foreign trade. In addition, the Standard International Trade Classification (SITC) Rev 3, which is the classification of international trade issued by the United Nations Statistical Division (UNSD), is used for the compilation of both the imports and exports of goods. Finally, the classification of imports by Broad Economic Categories (BEC) is also based on international standards recommended by the UNSD.

### 2.2 System of Trade

The "General Trade System" is the system of coverage used in the tabulation of merchandise in this report. Under this system, all goods entering the Cayman Islands are recorded as imports while all goods leaving the country are recorded as exports.

### 2.3 Coverage

This report covers merchandise trade only. Trade in services are not included.
Included in the import and export statistics in this publication are goods sent abroad for repair and returned and goods re-exported as incorrect or faulty since they cannot be easily identified as such at the time of importation. Excluded are goods in transit or other transshipments not destined for the Cayman Islands market, bank notes and coins in circulation; and parcel post exports. Goods brought into the country directly by residents but are not declared are also excluded by default for lack of documentation.

The values recorded for imports and exports over a particular period represent the documents brought to account by Customs during that period. They may also include some goods actually arriving towards the end of the previous period but are accounted for in the current period.

Exports statistics cover both re-exports and domestic exports. Re-exports, which comprise the larger part of exports, are goods of foreign origin which have not been materially transformed while in the Cayman Islands. Domestic exports include goods produced in the country, extracted from its natural resources or manufactured in the country. These include goods of foreign origin which have been assembled or transformed in the country.

### 2.4 Valuation

All values are shown in Cayman Islands dollars. Imports are valued at cost, insurance and freight (c.i.f) which is the value up to the time of delivery at the port. It includes incidental charges but excludes customs or any other duty paid on arrival.

Exports are valued at free on board (f.o.b), that is the value at which goods were sold by the exporters, and it includes all local charges to the exporting vessel or aircrafts. Freight and insurance are not included.

### 2.5 Revisions

Revisions are inevitable; as a result, merchandise trade imports data are revised on an ongoing basis for each quarter of the previous year. The previous two years data are revised annually and released in the current publication. The trade data on prior quarters and years have been revised largely as a consequence of corrections on previous errors, omissions, and misclassifications as reflected in the updated entries of the Customs computer system. From 2013-2017, imports were amended to include estimates of goods that entered the Cayman Islands through airports below the $\$ 350$ per person threshold. These estimates were based on the results of the household budget survey in 2015 and relevant immigration (resident arrivals) data. Imports were also adjusted to include estimates for goods procured in ports. Additionally exports has been adjusted to include goods procured by both foreign vessels and airlines.

### 2.7 Limitations

In the Cayman Islands, a number of importers do not provide codes, or provide improper codes. Over the years, this issue required the ESO to vigilantly verify codes and provide missing ones. ESO continues to review the imports data with the aim of improving the accuracy, reliability and proper classification of the data.

Given the volume of imports, full details of the quantity and value of all imports are not available. The new Cayman Islands Customs data collection system (TRIPS) and the new Customs Tariff 2012 which went into effect on March 1, 2013, have addressed some of the issues encountered with the previous system.

## 3. COMMENTARY

### 3.1 Visible trade balance

In 2017, the visible trade deficit increased by $\$ 37.8$ million, moving from a deficit of $\$ 810.2$ million in 2016, to $\$ 848.3$ million. This resulted from a 2.7 percent increase in the importation of goods along with a 34.8 percent decline in exports. The growth in imports was driven by the increased value of mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials imported, while the reduced exports primarily reflected a decline in the export of commodities and transactions not classified elsewhere (see Chart 1).

The largest contributors to the trade deficit were: (a) food and live animals (\$176.7 million); (b) machinery and transport equipment ( $\$ 160.9$ million); (c) miscellaneous manufactured articles (\$126.2 million); and (d) manufactured goods classified chiefly by materials ( $\$ 103.3$ million) (see Table 1.1).

### 3.2 Imports

In 2017, the total value of goods imported into the Cayman Islands increased by $\$ 23.4$ million or 2.7 percent to reach $\$ 876.0$ million, compared to $\$ 852.6$ million recorded in 2016 (see Tables 2.1 to 2.7).

The growth in imports in 2017 was largely driven by the increase in the value of petroleum products (mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials) which amounted to \$109 million, higher by $\$ 15.8$ million or 17.0 percent compared to 2016 . The increase was due primarily to the continued increase in the international price of fuel, together with a rise in total quantity. With this increase in 2017, the percentage share of these imports to total imports rebounded from 10.9 percent in 2016to 12.5 percent in 2017 (see Chart 2).

Non-petroleum products increased by $\$ 7.5$ million or 1.0 percent to $\$ 767.0$ million compared to the $\$ 759.5$ million recorded in 2016. Among non-petroleum products, the importation of miscellaneous manufactured articles led the growth, increasing by $\$ 11.7$ million or 10.1 percent. In contrast, the importation of commodities and transaction not classified elsewhere dropped by $\$ 16.1$ million or 14.5 percent mainly due to gold imports; its share to total imports thus fell to 10.9 percent from the 13.1 percent recorded in 2016. ## Imports by category of goods

The primary contributor to the increased value of imports for 2017 was the significant increase in mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials which went up by 17.0 percent to reach $\$ 109.0$ million in 2017, up from the $\$ 93.2$ million recorded in 2016. This sharp growth was due to increases in both the price and quantity imported. On average, the price of petroleum fuel products (excluding natural gas) increased by an estimated 17.5 percent, while overall volume of fuel imported grew by 2.1 percent for 2017 over 2016.

The importation of miscellaneous manufactured articles recorded an increase of 10.1 percent, moving from a value of $\$ 116.4$ million in 2016 to $\$ 128.2$ million in 2017. This was largely attributed to the rise in imports of furniture and parts thereof, articles of apparel and clothing accessories, professional, scientific and controlling instruments nie and photographic equipment supplies and watches. Additionally, the importation of items of antiques grew by 271.9 percent and the imports of articles of plastic increased by 29.6 percent. In contrast
to the increases above, there were declines in reading materials (7.9\%), sporting goods (17.3\%) and items relating to records and tapes (including DVD's and CD's) which had a decline of 58.6 percent. In addition, imports of other jewellery not of precious metal registered a decline of 7.7 percent.

Manufactured goods classified chiefly by materials moved up by 9.0 percent to reach $\$ 103.7$ million in 2017 compared to $\$ 95.2$ million recorded in 2016. This performance reflected increases in structures and products (parts of iron, steel, and aluminium) which grew by 26.1 percent or $\$ 8.4$ million in 2017 compared to 2016. Imports of paper, paperboard and articles of paper, pulp, paperboard grew by 26.2 percent. Other notable increases for this subcategory included imports of rubber and articles thereof, other metal goods n.e.s. and sanitary and plumbing fixtures, which reflected growth of 13.4 percent, 7.2 percent and 27.4 percent, respectively. Partially offsetting these increases was a decline in lime and refractory materials by $\$ 2.6$ million or 17.0 percent. Additionally, there were reductions in the imports of hand tools, crystal glassware, and porcelain and chinaware of 34.1 percent, 60.8 percent and 19.9 percent, respectively. In summary, most subcategories of building materials continued on the strong growth that characterized most of 2017.

Crude materials, inedible, except fuels grew by 12.9 percent to $\$ 16.4$ million. This was on account of the increases in imports of cork and wood (22.3\%), crude fertilizers and minerals ( $8.1 \%$ ) and crude animal and vegetable materials, n.e.s ( $9.5 \%$ ). The increased cork and wood imports occurred due to the 19.8 percent growth in imports of lumber while the imports of live plants, which grew by 10.4 percent, was the primary contributor to the increased imports of crude animal and vegetable materials, n.e.s.

In 2017, the value of food and live animals imported continued on the upward trend, increasing to $\$ 176.9$ million or 3.1 percent compared to 2016 . This increase reflected growth in a number of items. Importation of meat and meat preparations grew by $\$ 2.5$ million or 11.7 percent. This reflected increased imports of beef (fresh, chilled, frozen), poultry and other edible meats by 19.4 percent, 9.4 percent, and 8.5 percent, respectively. There was an overall marginal reduction in imports of vegetables and fruit by 1.2 percent. Additionally, there were increased imports of dairy products and bird's eggs by $\$ 2.1$ million for 2017. Imports of sugar, sugar preparations and honey increased by 46.1 percent for 2017. There was, however, a significant reduction in miscellaneous edible products and preparations by $\$ 2.3$ million or 3.1 percent for 2017 compared to 2016.

The reduction in the value of imports of non-monetary gold ${ }^{1}$ by 89.2 percent accounted for the overall 14.5 percent decline in imports of commodities and transactions n.e.c. For 2017, the total value of non-monetary gold imports was $\$ 2.4$ million compared to $\$ 22.4$ million

[^0]recorded in 2016. There was, however, an increase in goods imported via air terminal and courier by 7.6 percent, as well as imports of special items not classified elsewhere, which grew by $\$ 1.2$ million or 104.2 percent for 2017.

Imports of machinery and transport equipment declined by 1.1 percent for the review year, partially offsetting the overall increase in imports. This reduction primarily reflected decreased imports of telecommunications and sound recording and reproducing apparatus and equipment, power generating machinery and equipment and office machines and automatic data processing machines by 20.3 percent, 13.8 percent and 12.1 percent, respectively. Additionally, the value of imports of vehicles showed a slight drop, moving from $\$ 72.0$ million to $\$ 71.2$ million. However, there were increased imports of electrical machinery n.e.s ( $7.3 \%$ ), general industrial machinery and equipment n.e.s ( $9.2 \%$ ) and other transport equipment (including aircraft and associated equipment e.t.c.) (26.7\%).

Imports of beverages and tobacco fell by 2.0 percent to $\$ 33.7$ million in 2017. This was due primarily to the reduced imports of beverages which declined by 4.5 percent to $\$ 28.7$ million, with beverages such as beers and table wines reflecting declines of 29.2 percent and 9.8 percent, respectively. In contrast, tobacco and tobacco manufactures increased by 15.4 percent to $\$ 5.0$ million in 2017, with cigarettes increasing by 16.7 percent to $\$ 3.4$ million while imports of cigars grew by 12.7 percent to reach $\$ 1.6$ million.

Chemical and related products n.e.s. declined marginally by 1.2 percent to $\$ 43.0$ million in 2017, down from the $\$ 43.5$ million recorded in the previous year. This outturn was driven primarily by reductions in imports of dye, tanning and colouring materials and chemical materials and products n.e.s by 14.1 percent and 7.1 percent, respectively. There were, however, partially offsetting increases in imports of inorganic chemicals and essential oils and perfume materials by 32.2 and 2.2 percent, respectively.

## Imports by country of origin

The United States of America (USA) continues to be the largest trading partner of the Cayman Islands. However, its overall share of Cayman imports declined marginally from 84.5 percent, or $\$ 720.8$ million of total imports in 2016 to $\$ 731.0$ million or 83.5 percent of imports in 2017. This reduction is mainly attributable to the fall in imports of gold. Imports from Jamaica, the U.K and Mexico all increased to higher trading shares of 1.9 percent, 1.1 percent and 0.7 percent, respectively. However, imports from Japan and Germany fell in 2017 to record shares of 1.5 percent and 0.4 percent, respectively, which reflects the decline in imports of machinery equipment and transport goods.

## Imports by broad economic category

Analysis of imports by broad economic categories (BEC) of end use reveals that most major sub-categories increased, except for capital goods (except transport equipment) and parts and accessories thereof, and consumer goods not elsewhere specified.

Intermediate goods grew by 8.3 percent from $\$ 162.0$ million in 2016 to $\$ 175.5$ million in 2017. Significantly influencing this outcome is the rise in the imports of industrial supplies and parts $\mathcal{E}$ accessories of transport equipment and intermediate related capital goods.

The value of transport equipment, and parts and accessories thereof recorded a growth of 1.8 percent and stood at $\$ 84.3$ million in 2017 . This outturn occurred as a result of an increase in parts and accessories and other (non-industrial) transport equipment. In contrast, passenger motor cars recorded a decline of 2.8 percent for 2017.

Consumption goods imports contracted by 2.5 percent in 2017. This was driven by the reduction in the imports of durable goods such as domestic refrigerators, radios and travel goods. Food and Beverages (both primary and processed) for household consumption showed growth for 2017 compared to 2016, with primary food growing by 7.9 percent and processed food and beverage increasing by 1.2 percent. Goods not elsewhere specified also recorded a growth, increasing by $\$ 7.4$ million ( $8.9 \%$ ) to $\$ 90.7$ million for 2017.

Capital goods saw a reduction of 3.5 percent to reach $\$ 88.2$ million for the review year, largely on account of the fall in imports of motors and generators, construction and machinery and telecommunication equipment for 2017 (see Tables 2.7a and 2.7b).

### 3.3 Exports

In 2017, estimated merchandise exports contracted by 34.8 percent to $\$ 27.7$ million compared to the $\$ 42.5$ million recorded in 2016 . This reduction was primarily attributed to commodities and transactions not elsewhere classified which accounted for 22.2 percent of recorded exports. Also contributing to the overall decline were reductions in food and live animals and beverages and tobacco exports which posted reductions of 74.9 percent and 80.1 percent, respectively.
